Total number of marks allotted to this question shall be 20 (4x5) and every short-answer shall not exceed 50 words. Questions 2 to 6, shall be long answer questions with internal choice from the five prescribed units and the students shall be required to attempt any four. Each question shall be of 15 marks.
